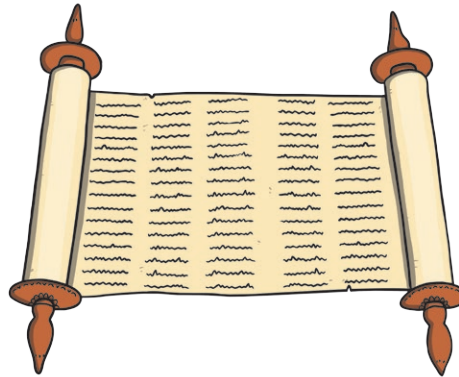

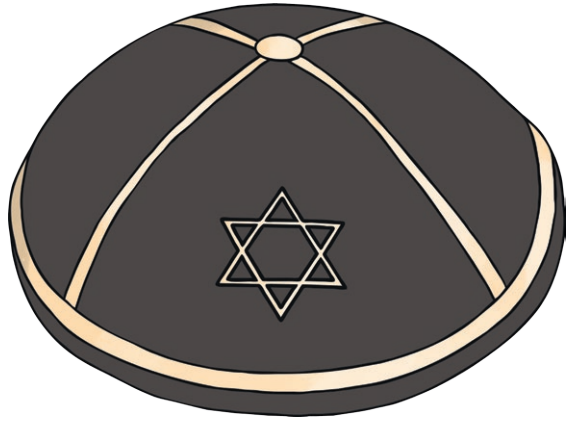

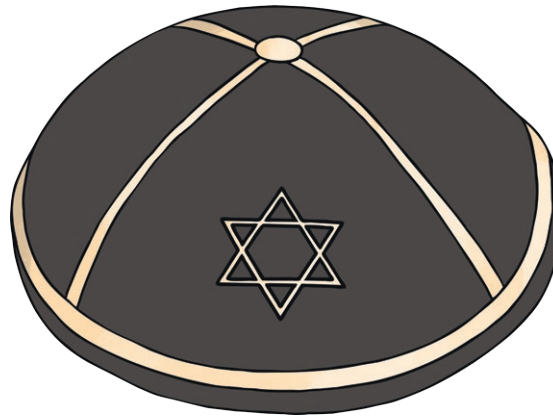


Star of David

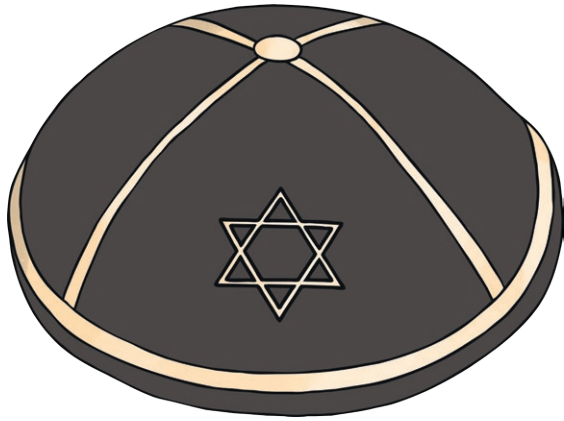


Kippah

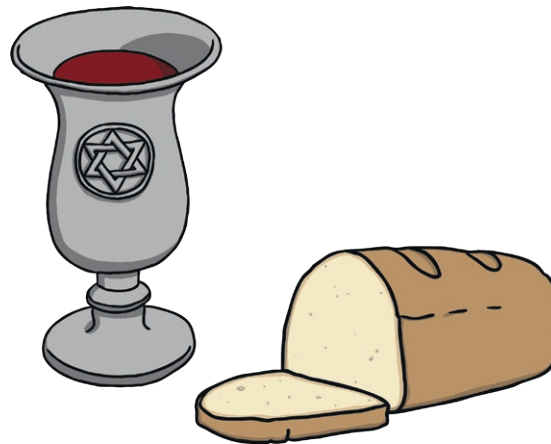


Tallit

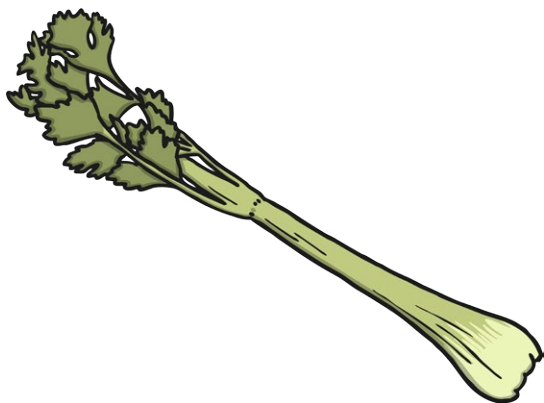


seder plate

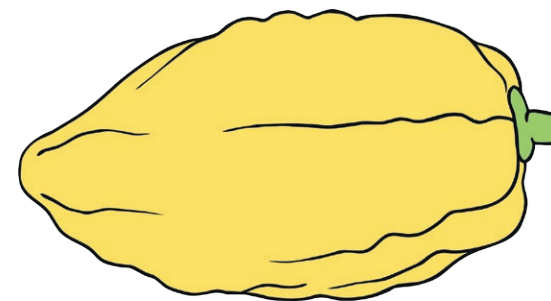


celery

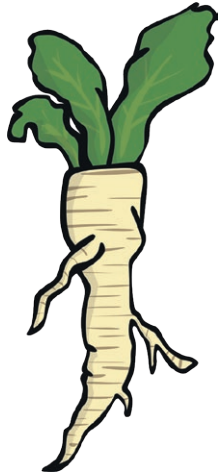


dreidel

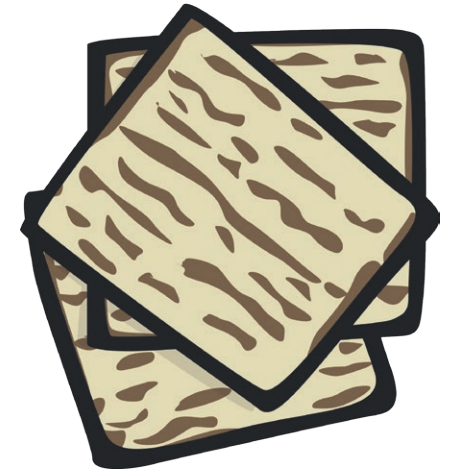


horseradish

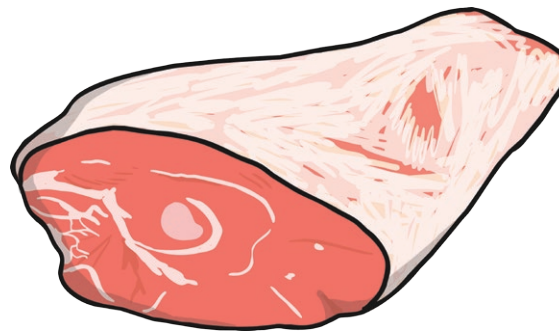


matzos

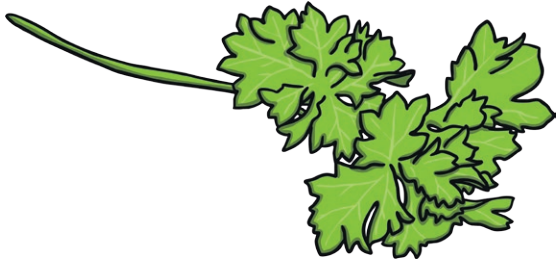


lamb

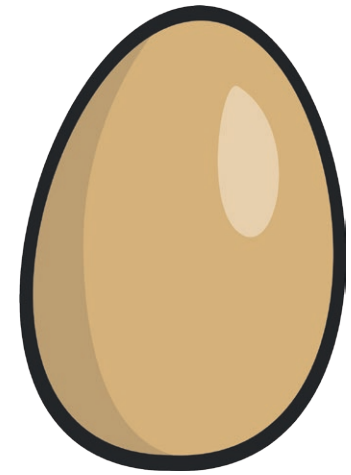

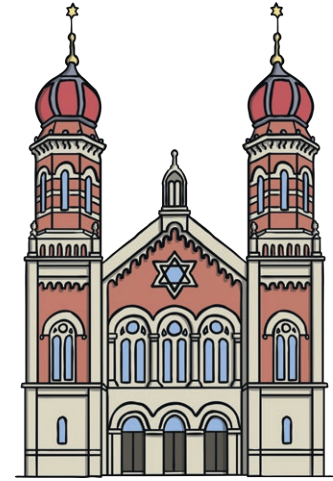

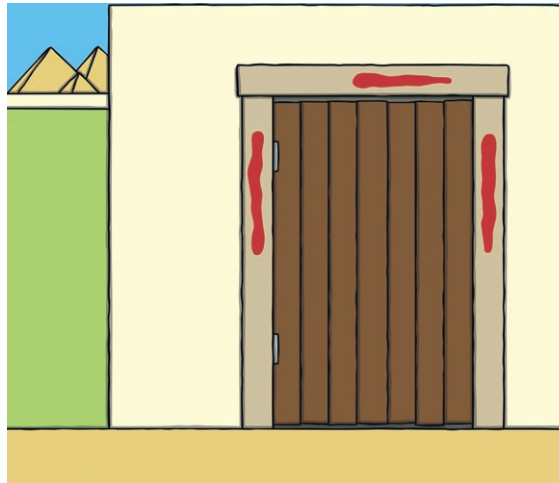
